NSWPPA Awards 2025

Every year we have the honour of recognising the work of our colleagues through the nomination and selection of recipients of the following awards.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP or FELLOWSHIP

FELLOWSHIP of the Association may be bestowed upon a member whose service to Education and to the Association is both long-standing and exemplary.

LIFE MEMBERSHIP of the Association may be bestowed upon a retired member and/or a member in their final year of employment in the teaching service, whose service to Education and to the Association is both long-standing and exemplary. It is usually awarded to a member in their final year of employment in the teaching service, or at an appropriate time on the recommendation of the NSWPPA State Executive and endorsed by the NSWPPA State Council.

In assessing nominations for Life Membership or Fellowship, the following criteria should be addressed:

- a) a minimum period of five years' service to the Association
- b) consideration of the level of service to the Association through outstanding contributions at a state or area level in matters such as, for example:
 - administration and management of the Association,
 - representation on state committees or working parties,
 - preparation of papers on behalf of the Association,

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

The Distinguished Service Award is bestowed upon a member whose service to Area Councils, Reference Groups, Standing Committees or Working Parties has been exemplary for a minimum period of five years. This service may include the administration and management of the relevant bodies or support of colleagues associated with those bodies.

PROFESSIONAL AWARD

The award will be made to a Primary Principal who has made a significant contribution to Primary education and the Principalship at the School, Area or State level in matters such as, for example: initiating significant educational change; undertaking the support and welfare of colleagues; and/or enhancing the professional standing of Primary Principals; fostering the professional development of Primary Principals.

ABORIGINAL EDUCATION & COMMUNITIES AWARD

Area Councils may nominate one Principal and/or School from their Area, addressing for example how:

- the Program/ Principal has made a difference to Aboriginal students/ communities
- the Program/ Principal has changed the outcomes for Aboriginal students or communities; and/or the Program/ Principal has changed community attitudes.

Steve McAlister's service to Public Education and to the New South Wales Primary Principals' Association is both extensive and exemplary.



Since commencing at Eungai Public School in 2023, Dylan has demonstrated exceptional leadership in embedding Aboriginal perspectives, culture, and community partnerships at the heart of the school's identity. From the outset, Dylan prioritised authentic connection, meeting and yarning with every Aboriginal family to establish trust, gather feedback, and co-develop a shared vision for the future.


This vision has been translated into action through the establishment of a strong Aboriginal Education team, the co-construction of Personalised Learning Pathways (PLPs) with families, and the embedding of cultural goals that guide student learning. Exemplifying this, students such as Balan have proudly led language initiatives, ensuring Dunghutti words and stories are now woven into the school's daily routines.

Community-led cultural practices—including dance, weaving, art, bush tucker gardening, cooking, and clapstick-making—have become central to the school experience. Signature initiatives such as the Young Deadly Leadership program, the Songs of Garuugga library installation, and student-designed uniforms have elevated Aboriginal student voice, strengthened identity, and increased enrolments.

Elders and community members are active partners, leading on-Country learning, smoking ceremonies, and storytelling that connect students to land, history, and culture. Through visible symbols such as Aboriginal maps, artworks, and Acknowledgement of Country in language, pride and respect are consistently fostered.

This body of work reflects Dylan's outstanding achievement in Aboriginal Education, honouring culture while building a united, aspirational school community recognised for its innovation, inclusivity, and deep respect for Country and people.

He is a worthy recipient of the NSWPPA Aboriginal Education & Communities Award.






